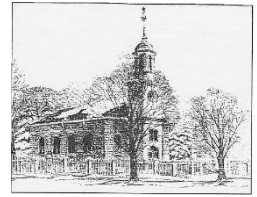

Dear Friends,

Some of you may remember that I began writing ***Cloistering Along*** meditations on March 17, 2020. Although almost five years ago, I will never forget that date, for it was when the seriousness of the Pandemic first fully hit me. Jeff and I were scheduled to fly out to Southern California to visit my son on that date. However, he called me a few days before, warning that I better not step foot on the plane; I might just get stuck out there for a very long time.

Cloistering Along followed daily for several months, and then weekly, for three full years. I pressed the pause button for a few months, and then began again in November of 2023, taking a new name ***Beyond Cloistering***. The parish was going through a very difficult time financially. We were especially feeling the lingering toll of the Pandemic and the reality of no more government assistance as we transitioned out of those lock-down years. It seemed the right thing to do to start writing again. After all, the verse above, although not from the Psalms, reminds us that kinsfolk (and I think church family applies here) are born to share adversity. That is a lesson that was brought home in a mighty way during those difficult years. We learned to help each other in new ways, sharing our joys and sorrows.

The vast majority of ***Cloisterings*** have centered on verses from the Psalms. With 150 chapters to that book, there is plenty of material to draw from, and so far, I have given you 365 different meditations on the Psalms alone. Which has got me thinking. Perhaps it is about time for another shift in direction.

As I prepare for my retirement, I have been thinking about what I will do next. Writing these weekly meditations is one thing I have truly enjoyed. And so, I am thinking about moving on to the Book of Proverbs. Have you ever read it? It is quite interesting, entertaining, and full of wisdom. Unlike the Psalms, it is not prayerful at all. It is full of adages and pithy sayings. The kind of things you can imagine your grandfather or grandmother muttering under their breaths. And they speak truth.

Like the one above, for instance. *A friend loves at all times, and kinsfolk are born to share adversity.* Isn't it true? At least that is the ideal: the perfect idea of what makes a perfect friendship, perfect family. A true friend loves you no matter what. That's not so very easy. And the perfect family? They will stand by you, even when you undermine them or behave so foolishly that they wish they could say they didn't know you.

But what a wonderful verse. For me, it captures something of the theme of this month of November: LOVE. For love is so much more than a sentimental feeling. It is a sustaining presence. One that keeps us going because we know we can count on it. I have been fortunate to have found it all over the place in my life. I hope you have, too! It is one of the wonderful aspects of belonging to a community of Faith: we pledge to love each other as Christ loves us (as I so often say at the offertory before Holy Eucharist). And that is certainly a tall order!

We love no matter what. Isn't that a marvelous thought? Hang onto this one. I'm sure you will need it. And think about how you show your love – not just with your spouse or children, but with your fellow parishioners and seekers after God. We are all in this together, whether we are near or far, whether good times or bad.

A friend loves at all times, and kinsfolk are born to share adversity. I'm hanging onto this one with both hands, both legs, and everything in-between.

WEATHER AGAIN COMPLEMENTS CROP WALK



On Sunday, October 19, several hundred people representing schools and churches in the area set off for the 44th annual Crop Walk, which raises money for Church World Service and collects food for local food pantries.

As usual, Christ Church parishioners made substantial contributions to the effort, particularly in the cans and bags of food left in the Parish House. After the Sunday service, we loaded 24 jars of peanut butter, 12 cans of pork and beans, 25 cans of soup, 16 pounds of rice, five pounds of beans and lentils, plus 25 pounds of pasta into the back of my car.

Arriving at Red Bank High School, we found boys and girls wearing spiffy ROTC uniforms helped unload dozens of cars full of similar donations.

Though the weather was lovely – neither too warm as in past years nor rainy (which seldom happens) – competing activities kept our number of walkers down. But we met up with others from the Presbyterian Church next door and St. John's in Little Silver, so we few walkers could reconnect with friends from previous walks.

Among the delights of the three-mile walk through Red Bank was observing the number and variety of Halloween decorations gracing front lawns we saw along the way. As usual, the route was well-monitored with crossing guards assuring safety.

At last count, our parish has contributed over \$500 in monetary donations. The Crop Walk website is still up for others wanting to donate.
