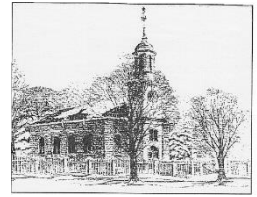

Dear Friends,

Here is a little post-confirmation fact for you: did you know that the above phrase was written by an Anglican parish priest and prolific writer, in the seventeenth century? Actually, it was modified a bit through time: his original words were *“To him that will, ways are not wanting.”*

I like the phrase, but I am going to modify it a bit further for you today: *“Where there’s a **Will**, there’s a way.”*

I promised our Stewardship Chair and Senior Warden Peggy James that I would write this month’s article about stewardship. I imagine she was thinking about the 2025 Pledge Campaign which is upon us (I am also thinking about it these days), but I have something else on my mind, important to each and every one of you. Your Will.

A Will is a decision you make now on behalf of the future: to make decisions easier for your family and to provide for the care of your loved ones. It is also the place where you can make a promise for the future of those institutions you cherish - in this case, the future Christ Church.

We all know the challenges that face churches these days. We know how slow it has been to spring back from the pandemic. We know that membership right here at Christ Church has diminished (although we are working on that and seeing real growth!). And I hope by now you know by now that we would not have made it through these difficult times if not for the thoughtful bequests left to us by previous members.

The arrangements they made to remember the church upon their deaths is what comprises our endowments. They are not merely a safety net. They allow us to take on the work at hand without having to fret over how we will keep our doors open the next year. We are so blessed to be a church that has this extra layer of protection. It is what has kept us smiling at the future. Those benefactors are even now – lo these many years later - watching over us. Seeing us through! Continuing their legacy. Say a prayer of thanks for all who have gone before us!

Now it is your turn. You may be concerned about your own children. You may be thinking that you do not have any extra to give. First, let me say that I indeed want you to provide for your children; I know I have. But I also want you to provide for *our* children, as well as our children of the future. It is not so much about the amount that you are able to leave, but the fact that your commitment to Christ and his Church is so important that you want it to sustain future generations.

This is why I say *every person* can and should remember the Church. The Church that has been with you since childhood, the Faith that has nurtured, sustained, and comforted you. It is the many small gifts that have for the most part made up the whole of our endowments. No gift is too small when it comes from the heart and desires to continue the work of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Talk to your spouse about it. Pray about it. Discuss it with your financial advisor, if you have one. There are ways to give that make little impact on the whole of your estate. After all, remember that anything given to the Church is not taxed. So, leave those Roth IRAs to your kids (the taxes on them are already paid and done). Perhaps look at some of your other stocks or funds that are not. Or think about a lump sum that you could easily gift to the church. Perhaps that Christmas account that you haven’t used.

For it really is true: *Where there’s a **Will**, there’s a way.* Those Wills allow us to make a way for the future. Your Will enables the church to continue to grow, prosper, and be a safe haven for generations to come.

Soon you will receive your 2025 Pledge Certificate. Don’t rush over it; linger over the box that states that you intend to remember Christ Church in your Will. No need to tell us what you plan to give (after all, that may change over time). But do let us know. It is a promise you make not only to yourselves, not only to the church you love, but a promise you make to God. To be a part of this community of Faith even beyond the grave.

MARTHA'S CUPBOARD REVISITED

Martha's Cupboard is one of the outreach programs at Christ Church. The primary purpose of the program is to facilitate food delivery from Fulfill of Monmouth County to Washington Manor a Senior Citizen apartment building located in Long Branch. We have partnered with Fulfill for over 15 years, donating and delivering food collected at Church and supplied by Fulfill. During Covid there were changes made to the program including no admittance to the building and some disruption in deliveries. Because Covid donations to Fulfill were severely reduced we received a grant of \$5,000.00 to directly purchase food for Washington Manor. That money plus donations to Outreach is used to buy fresh food and groceries twice a month that get delivered directly to Washington Manor. My goal is to make some changes to this outreach program starting in 2025. I would like to collect and distribute cleaning and health related supplies. I would also like to grow and strengthen our relationship with the residents of Washington Manor. I will be looking for ideas and help before the New Year begins.

MUSIC AND THE AGING MIND

A few Crown articles ago, I wrote about the effects of music on the brain and hormones. This time, we will take a brief look at some of the benefits of music therapy for people with dementia, particularly Alzheimer's disease. As people in the U.S., and much of the developed world, live longer, treating dementia has become an urgent issue. Despite success in helping patients with many physical and mental ailments, pharmaceutical drugs have not shown much benefit in helping with dementia. There have been, however, some recent studies examining music and its positive effects on those with dementia. (Thanks to Bob Stewart for a copy of the article discussed.) In a recent article in *Neurology: Clinical Practice*, "Ten reasons why neurologists should refer patients with Alzheimer's dementia to music therapy," doctors at the University of Minnesota present some ideas for how music might be used to help with dementia. Though they recommend trained music therapists for medical settings, many of the ideas can be used at home, or in church, with family members and even by oneself. One example is that of simply listening to, singing, dancing, and playing musical instruments. This includes doing exercises to music and playing music games. There were concrete benefits related to brain and psychological functioning: in the studies, the people who did such activities showed improved functioning; those who did not do the musical activities showed no benefits. Another benefit to music is the ability to perhaps avoid strong antipsychotics, which have a plethora of unpleasant side effects, and not much benefit as of now. Much of the research, the authors point out, indicates that music activities can help when medications are detrimental to wellbeing. Moreover, provided the music choices used do not cause trauma to the individual (e.g., too loud or aggressive music selections—heavy metal and hardcore rap should perhaps be avoided!), it is well-tolerated and enjoyable for most people with dementia. As anyone who has listened to music knows, a powerful feature of music is its ability to evoke memories. When people listen to, sing, dance, or play music, the times and places—and people—are part of those memories. In addition, lyrics to songs are embedded in long-term memory: even those with Alzheimer's can often recall words to their favorite songs from the past. What else is

noteworthy in the studies? Learning new songs, even playing new instruments (at a rudimentary level) help to get the brain churning; it is never too late to do new musical activities, whether with a music therapist or with one's family, church, or friends. The effects of music on the aging brain are tangible and measurable. But, to me, the joy of making music is perhaps the most important feature. It is something only humans can do; doing so makes us more human, whatever the age of the brain.

“IT TAKES A VILLAGE”

Dearest Christ Church Shrewsbury family,

October is precious to me because it is my birth month. My friends never forget my birthday because it is so easy to remember. It just so happens that my birthday, which falls on the 10th of October, is also one of the biggest shopping sale dates in the Philippines every year. We call it the “10.10 Sale.” And that’s why almost no one I’m acquainted with forgets my birthday.

This year’s birthday is even more special for me, and it’s not because I went on a shopping spree. I spent my birthday out of the country, and it was my first solo international trip! It felt liberating, and I was so happy that I could say it was one of my most unforgettable experiences. So where did I go, and going to be alone, and there were no direct flights for me to go there because I live in the southern part of the country. And thankfully, everything was perfect! I paid for a joiners group city tour a month before the trip, and the terms and conditions section stated that if the required number of participants was not met, it would be canceled a day before the tour date. But on that day, I found out I was actually alone. No one else booked that tour, but still, the tour guide and the van driver came for me. I thought they were going to say that they were canceling it, and I also said that I wouldn’t mind if they wanted to cancel. But instead, the 60-year-old tour guide said, “No, you’re going to be my VIP today! You are very lucky because you have the van for yourself.” I know it’s unbelievable, but it happened, and my heart was full.

The people there are not good at communicating in English, but they are so kind and helpful. They always have a Google Translate ready for you. That’s why I chose Taiwan because I read reviews that it is very solo traveler friendly. I highly recommend it to anyone who wants to visit Asia. In my short time there, I learned a lot about their culture and their history because I didn’t just stay at the Metro Taipei; I went to provinces as well. They have entirely different beliefs than us because the majority of them follow the teachings of Buddhism and Taoism, but I respect it. I listened to the guides, read materials, and paid respect to their temples to

why did I choose that place? As you know, Mother Lisa is helping me get a tourist visa so I can personally visit the church, but because of my last visa rejection, I thought that perhaps having an international travel history as a solo traveler would help. So last October 9th, I traveled to Taiwan and stayed there for eight days, and everything went so smoothly. I was anxious pre-travel because I was going to be alone, and I know Philippine immigration is very strict. It also didn’t help that just two days before my travel date, Taiwan and the Philippines suffered from a strong storm that canceled all flights, so I was very nervous. But on the entire trip, everything went well. None of the negative scenarios I had in my head happened. The weather was so good, and immigration didn’t even ask me questions. I felt so blessed on my birthday. I say it’s the power of prayer because a month before my trip I prayed relentlessly that all would go well, especially since it was my first time. I was widen my knowledge and understand the world better. Because on the outside, we may look so different from one another, but inside, I know we are one. God created us all, and He gave us our free will, so it is up to us to seek our truths and calling.
